The President's Pen

Wasn't the End of Year Lunch at the Kingston Hotel a fabulous event? The Hotel is to be congratulated for providing a high quality and excellent value for money meal. All feedback about the meal and the atmosphere has been excellent. The occasion marked the end of a very satisfying 2006 for Kingborough U3A.

In November I attended, on behalf of U3A, the consultative group chaired by Council to discuss developments around Channel Court. For me it was an introductory session and membership is likely to broaden further as the Kingston Master Plan Review progresses. A consultant company named Ratio has been chosen to conduct the Review. Since that meeting breaking news in the media has included speculation on Minister David Bartlett's level of commitment to building a new Kingston High School, pressures from some other High Schools re capital works funds, and Mayor Bury's desire to see the Government hold to its core election promise to relocate the High School. In any deliberations in following months I shall emphasis our U3A's preference to remain in the Hutchins Street premises.

As we begin 2007 I'd appreciate feedback on a possible new project activity under our social programme. Some members have raised the problem of not being able to get the services of a tradesperson to help them with little jobs around the home – change light bulbs, fit brackets etc. Trades people it seems are too busy to take on small jobs for new clients. I'm wondering whether any or even many of our members might appreciate being able to contact a handy U3A home helper (for a cost on a "not-for-profit" basis). I'd appreciate you writing to me at our U3A post box with comment about your level of interest in, or view about, this project idea. The Committee will then be in a position to consider whether to progress this service.

It was a super 2006 and I look forward to sharing with you in our U3A programme and in our social activities during 2007. . I especially invite you to come to our AGM on 23rd March at Brookfield, as we are also planning to showcase a range of our activities for your enjoyment. See full details later in this newsletter

Bruce is a retired Academic, well known lecturer to Hobart and Kingborough U3A, with an interest in history and the human condition.

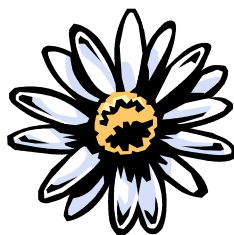
Monday 11:30 ELECTRICITY AND ELECTRONICS IN TODAY'S WORLD –Part 1 Greg Thé KA1
