Welsh is the most thriving of the Celtic languages and these sessions introduce the spoken language of today, with light relief from music, video, etc about Welsh culture. For rapid progress, sense of achievement and motivation, we shall take advantage of a prizewinning free internet course, "Say Something in Welsh" (www.saysomethinginwelsh.com), CDs or cassettes of which are available for those unable to access the internet themselves. We shall use the SSIW lessons in class and as homework, with extra explanation and practice. Free resources from BBC Wales, S4C (the Welsh TV Channel) and elsewhere will also sometimes be used. SSIW has learners speaking Welsh from the very start, and keeps them talking as their mastery grows. For later in the year, there is another beginners course, from the BBC, which we can use to expand our understanding of grammar and the written language. If you have any questions about the Welsh for beginners program, feel free to contact Peter (6239 1265) before enrolling.

Peter, from Bristol, studied in Hull and Belfast before lecturing in Uganda, and then specialised in social psychology, psycholinguistics and related fields at the University of Tasmania. He enjoys choral singing, art and everything about language.

This course is aimed at those who have completed a beginners' course and want to improve their command of spoken Welsh. There will be an opportunity each week for class members to speak about their activities in Welsh and to engage in conversation.

A range of resources from North and South Wales will be provided and some time will be devoted to the text Teach Yourself Welsh. Articles from the adult learners' magazine, Lingo Newydd will be used regularly for reading and discussion. There will also be some focus on listening to and singing Welsh songs.

Margaret comes from Anglesey in North Wales and Welsh was her first language when she immigrated to Tasmania in her mid-teens. She has kept her Welsh alive through communicating with Welsh speaking family members and friends in Australia and in Wales. EVERYTHING YOU WANTED TO KNOW ABOUT *FILEMAKER PRO* AND WERE AFRAID TO ASK

In December 2011 U3A KINGBOROUGH was advised that we were successful in our application for a grant from the TASMANIAN COMMUNITY FUND. We had applied for an amount of just under \$3000 to cover the purchase and setup of a computer program called FILEMAKER PRO. We now have the program and a dedicated computer to run the special software. Why did the management committee take this step? What is FILEMAKER PRO? To bring all our members into the picture we are including an edited version of that application.

THE PROJECT

To purchase and install a relational database and file serving computer.

WHO WE ARE

U3AK Inc is a self-help co-operative of enthusiastic volunteers whose objective is to organise and maintain, on a non-profit basis, a program of Third Age learning for retired and semi-retired people in the local community. Members pay a modest annual subscription to cover the cost of rent, printing and postage of newsletters and course information, and basic office and classroom equipment. We receive no outside financial assistance apart from the occasional grant. We welcome as members people living in the Kingborough and surrounding communities. There are no conditions or educational qualifications required. We run courses at the LINC CENTRE in Kingston and at the WESTWINDS COMMUNITY CENTRE in Woodbridge. The strength of community support is well demonstrated by our continuing high membership.

DESCRIPTION OF THE PROJECT

Since its inception in 2000, U3A Kingborough has experienced a rapid increase in numbers. We now have a membership of around 300 and this unanticipated rate of growth has stretched the efforts of hardworking volunteers who perform all the programming and management functions – *there are no paid staff*.

The most challenging task faced by our programmers is to find suitable tutors and course leaders who are prepared to commit to a ten week term, then to prepare and publish the syllabus for each term. The committee's routine management jobs include enrolling members, compiling and keeping membership records, preparing class lists, tutors' lists and timetables, writing and distributing regular newsletters, keeping of accounts and secretarial duties, operating and maintaining classroom equipment, as well as day to day "housekeeping" duties. We also run a program of social activities through the year, and maintain a members' book exchange.

In an effort to ease the burden on our precious volunteers, the management committee has investigated the setting up of a RELATIONAL DATABASE, a computer program to assist in routine repetitive tasks such as membership records, enrolment details, course lists, subscription payments, etc. During 2011 we have been trialling a relational database developed by one of our members whose contribution is estimated at 50 hours so far (at \$50/hour that's equivalent to \$3000).

We now have the computer and software and are preparing for a trial run at the February enrolment day.
